End of Year Expectations



- At the end of each term we assess children using the National Curriculum objectives and NFER assessment tests.
- In order for the children to achieve the expected standard they need to meet the majority of the objectives.
- In the summer term Y1 have statutory assessments in the form of a phonics screening check.

Phonics Screening Check



- Every June all Year 1 and some Year 2 pupils will need to complete the PSC.
- Children read 40 words: 20 real words and 20 'alien' words.
- Children will be used to this process, as we do mocks and will complete the check with a familiar adult.
- There will be a preparing for the PSC and how to support with home reading zoom meeting in the spring term.

Phonics screening check



- Like last year, ensure your child reads regularly and spots their 'Special friends' in words.
- Complete the RWI homework on the Google classroom

Behaviour and Rewards

Consequences and Rewards



- Consequences for inappropriate behaviour means time reflecting in the Responsibility Room, parents are informed and behaviour is logged.
- Gold and silver awards are awarded for positive behaviour (more than just being 'good' e.g. determination, resilience, act of kindness)
- Golden awards are put into a lottery every Friday.
- Headteacher's Awards linked to 3 values - Awarded weekly by the class teacher.
- Golden Reading Wheel - anyone who has read 5+ times a week are put into a lottery and winners receive tea with the SLT. Parents asked to sign the reading record as evidence they have read at home.
- House points can be given out daily and house cup awarded every term.

NEW for Sept 2023

Tea with SLT for winners in celebration assembly.

If children are consistently getting awarded golds or for reading 5 times a week then there are other special rewards term on term.

Pupils who are consistently getting their homework completed each term will also be rewarded.

Home-learning in Year 1



We believe that the importance of homework stretches beyond practising skills taught in school. As well as consolidating their newly learnt skills, children who complete homework on a regular basis develop lifelong study habits, resilience and independent learning skills. Research shows time and time again that homework hugely benefits factual knowledge, self-discipline, attitudes to learning and problem-solving skills and that children who complete homework are far more likely to gain academic success as well as feel more confident in school.

With this in mind, children in Year 1 will be set the following homework...

Home-learning in Year 1



- **Reading for 15 minutes, 5 times a week.** On average, reading 15 minutes a night equates to roughly 1.5 million more words a year! Just think of the advantage a child who reads has over one who doesn't. To further encourage reading, each child, whose reading diary shows five reads, enters the famous 'Reading Wheel' for that week with a chance to win a special 'tea' celebration in school.
- **Spellings** (5 words brought home each Tuesday for practising; test in school the following Wednesday).
- **Phonics practise** by watching Read, Write, Inc videos and completing linked tasks - all set on Google Classroom - alternating every other week with Maths.

Or

- **Maths task** set on Google Classroom - alternating every other week with phonics.

To promote reading and to develop good habits of completing home-learning tasks, we will be holding termly and yearly reward events for those children who complete their home-learning most of the time.

We hope that you will do your utmost to support your child in their home-learning.

All log ins will be stuck in the front cover of their reading record.

Parent Engagement and Communication



- Weekly newsletter - we try to keep letters to a minimum and add to the newsletter so you are not burdened with excessive emails.
- Please let staff see ALL children go with their parents before you approach them on the gate at the end of the day.
- Alternatively send an email to the office and they will call you as soon as they can but be aware they are teaching all day.
- If there is an issue regarding your child then please speak to the class teacher about initial concerns, if you are not happy with the response then it will move to the phase leader and then the senior leadership team.
- Parent evenings will be in November and February. November will be a light touch to see how they have settled in and in February books will be shared with you and progress spoken about in detail.
- NEW for 2023 - SEND support children will have a separate parent evening in the autumn term where the child's progress against their IEP targets will be discussed. At this meeting the class teacher and parent will make appointments for the following term so please bring your diaries to this meeting. EHCP children will have separate meetings with SENDCo CT and 1:1 as last year.

Y1 – 6 Unisex Uniform



Uniform Year 1-6

- Red V-neck sweatshirt or cardigan with school logo
- White shirt with a school tie
- Red checked gingham dress
- Grey skirt, culottes, tailored trousers/ shorts or pinafore dress (skirts should be of a reasonable length with no side splits)
- Plain socks or tights (**white or grey** no trainer socks)
- Black shoes (Non-slip and flat. No trainers or boots which are higher than the ankle or open toes)

Children will be changed into spare uniform if they do not come into school with the correct uniform.

If you need any support with uniform then please be aware that JOPSPA have a preloved uniform sale so contact the office for more information.

Other items of uniform



PE kit

- White plain T-shirt
- Red shorts
- Trainers or black plimsolls (outdoor P.E. – pupils will be barefoot for indoor P.E.)
- Plain black or grey tracksuit (can be worn for outdoor P.E. in the winter months)

PE Kit will need to be worn to school on the days that your child has PE which will be twice a week for Y1-6.

Hair

- Functional and simple hair clips or bands are acceptable. They should be plain in design and either red, white or black.

As part of our OPAL provision all children need a pair of wellington boots and a waterproof jacket/ puddlesuit as we will be going outside in all weathers. They will need to be kept in school but can come home in holidays if you prefer.

Since we started OPAL in 2022 we have been giving our pupils a rich choice of play experiences. Pupils are now more prepared for post lunch learning and have lots of opportunities to experience social and solo play of their own choosing. In addition to this, we have seen the start of a decrease in some year groups of playtime incidences.

PE lessons

- All jewellery has to be taken off for P.E.
- If you have recently had your ears pierced then we will allow 3 weeks of no PE before we will expect you to be able to take them out and take part. Please teach your children how to take them out themselves as staff are not allowed to help them with this or alternatively leave them out on PE days.
- Tape on ears is not allowed.
- If a child is a little off colour they will still take part in PE lessons but we appreciate they won't be full fitness.

Clubs and Sport at JOPS

- All school run clubs start week of 18th September with booking opening on 12th September. Some clubs are to prepare for certain events and are invite only and others are open to all.
- There is a charge for £30 for 10 sessions.
- Please email the office if you have been unable to book on and want to be put onto the waiting lists for certain clubs. We will then give you first refusal for this club if it continues the following term.
- Outside providers will have told you when they were starting.
- The decision on the selection of squads and teams is a school decision. It will be based on the child's skill in that sport, attendance to sessions previously, attitude and behaviour in the sessions and in school as they may be representing the school later down the line.
- We know it will be disappointing for the children if they are not selected, however this is an important lesson in life. One of our values is aspiration and helping the children to be resilient and develop the ability to pick themselves up when things don't go to plan and to try again. It's hard but this is not the first time they will go through it.
- As parents, we do expect you to support the school's decisions on selection - you may not like the decision but we do need your support.
